Program Modifications

Teacher Education Programs. NSU requests degree designation changes for all teacher preparation programs. Advisors have encountered recent situations with early childhood, elementary, and special education degrees making it difficult for students to meet the Bachelor of Science liberal arts requirement. As the interpretation of the 4 x12 requirement has evolved to include pedagogical courses which are not Liberal Arts and as the legislature has required more and more specific course work which adds to the major, students in these three majors must take additional courses outside their major requirements to meet the Liberal Arts requirement. Most teacher education programs have no elective hours. These additional courses can impact financial aid. Adjusting all teacher preparation programs to Bachelor of Specialty should resolve this issue for the three particular programs as well as maintain degree designation consistency across programs.

Program Deletions

Environmental, Health and Safety Management, M.S. (096). This program was suspended in September 2017, and all students in the pipeline have graduated. Students who have an interest in this area may select the Environmental, Health and Safety Management option in the Business Administration, M.B.A. program.

Human and Family Sciences, B.S. (045). This program was suspended in April 2016, and all students in the pipeline have graduated. Students have other degree choices including psychology, sociology, and social work.

This is the approximate cost of materials that students currently purchase for each course. In all cases students are paying well over the cost of the proposed fee for materials because they cannot consolidate shipping or buy in bulk. These fees would go directly towards purchasing each student all the materials they will need to complete the course. Students are able to keep these materials after the course is complete. Students will have to continue to seek out and purchase their own materials. They will continue to bear the additional costs of shipping and not buying at scale. Additionally, they may suffer delays in acquisition that put them behind in course work. The increased fee will help to guarantee sufficient funds to support these operations. Furthermore, a review of our international applications process has revealed that the current low application fee has encouraged numerous applications from those with no real intent to enroll at ECU, which has overburdened staff in offices that handle international admissions. The higher application fee will help ensure applicants have a serious intent to enroll at ECU.
